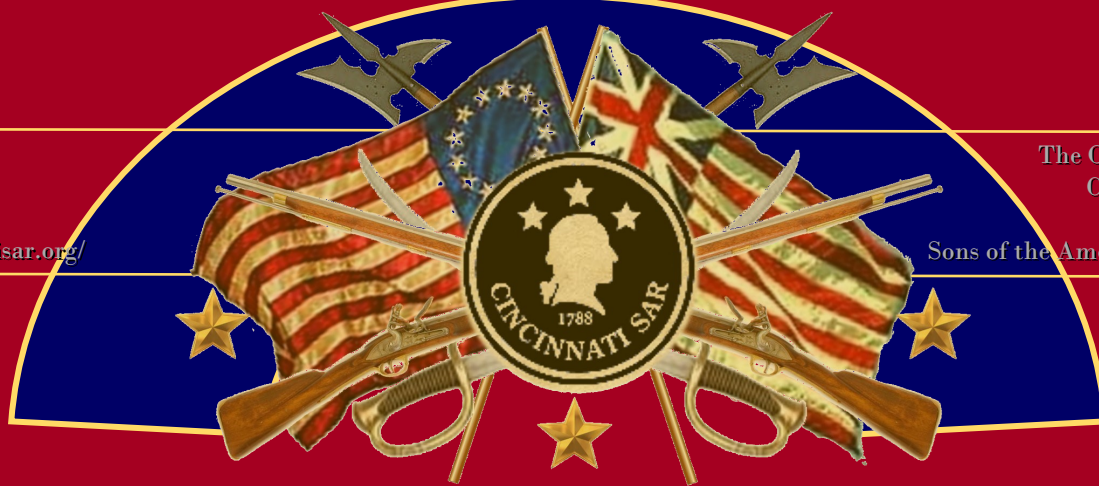

AN UPDATE FROM THE PRESIDENT...

Compatriots & Friends of the Cincinnati Chapter SAR,

It is hard to believe that one quarter of 2024 is over. As I write this, our April meeting has already occurred, so I have already presided over 40% of the regular BOM meetings scheduled for my term as President this year. Time is flying.

It has been a momentous year so far. We have learned since my last message that the Cincinnati Chapter's January 1st, 2024, membership was 237 members, up nine members from January 1st, 2023. As of April 1st, we were at 244 members having added four reinstatements and four new members. With the new member applications in the pipeline, we have a good chance of reaching 260 members and setting a modern era membership high before year-end.

Winter is typically a slower time, but we had a major event in January for the opening of the "Revolutionary War Experience" travelling exhibit at the Harmon Museum in Lebanon, OH. Over 200 people attended the opening reception, and over 2000 visited the exhibit during its one-month run at the museum.

We had pleasant weather for early February and a good turnout for the commemoration of William Henry Harrison's 251st birthday at the Presidential tomb in North Bend, OH. Later in February, approximately twenty members plus their guests attended and participated in an enjoyable Presidents Day luncheon hosted by the Cincinnati Chapter of the DAR.

Now we are moving into the busiest months of the year. Non-SAR organizations have invited us to take part in at more than six events so far this year that we have not participated in before. Most of these events are new and some of them are one-time events including special anniversaries and dedications.

I had thought things would pick up as America's 250th anniversary drew nearer. I believe it has started and will continue. Our presence is increasingly in demand. Public interest in the Revolutionary War and the founding of the nation is increasing. Many SAR members, like me, are old enough to remember our country's Bicentennial, but many, like me, were not yet SAR members at that time.

This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for most of us as individuals and for us as an organization. It is an exciting time to be a member of the Sons of the American Revolution. The celebrations and commemorations of the events that resulted in our independence and shaped the nation will continue up through July 4, 2026, and should continue for more than ten years beyond that. In the middle of it all, the SAR will hold its 2028 National Congress in Cincinnati.

If you have not gotten involved or have not been involved recently, you are most welcome, and it is an excellent time to come and join us.

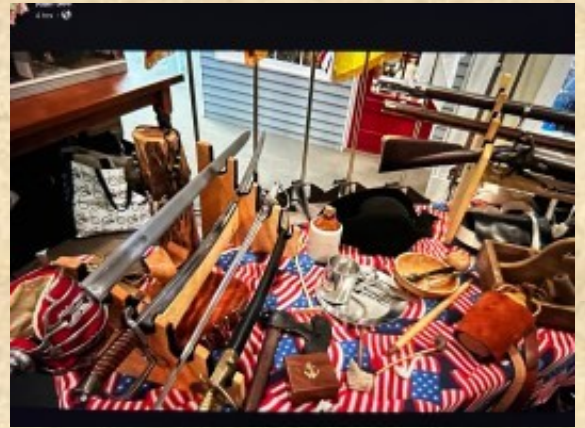

William Henry Harrison—Birthday Bash!

On Friday February 9th, 2024, there was a celebration of the birthday of former Ohio native and US President William Henry Harrison.

The program started with a parade starting at the North Bend Ohio Municipal Building and headed up the hill for about a mile to the William Henry Harrison Tomb.

The weather was blustery however mild for February. For that we were grateful.

The parade was led by members of the Cincinnati Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution with help from local Eagle Scouts carrying the flags. Once to the tomb, the participants assembled on the area outside the tomb where local and state dignitaries joined to speak to the crowd.

There was music provided by the a local school choir. A number of speakers made remarks to the group, covering the history of William Henry Harrison including his short tenure as US President.

The Cincinnati Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution – Nolan Carson Color Guard performed a musket salute, followed by a ceremonial “mourn arms” while a member of our local armed forces played taps.

At that point the ceremony ended and the crowd disbursed.

Happy Birthday to William Henry Harrison, his legacy is us remembering the contributions he made to our great country and Ohio.



Presidents Day Luncheon

On Saturday February 17th, there was a special event, featuring the nations first president and first lady.

The Daughters of the American Revolution, combining with the Sons of the American Revolution and Children of the American Revolution joined forces to welcome George and Martha Washington at a Presidents Day Luncheon.

The events featured star power of the first President and his wife Martha Washington. President Washington thanked his wife Martha for attending this event last year on his behalf.

The event started with the posting of the colors by the Nolan Carson Color Guard of the Cincinnati Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, followed by a call to order.

Speakers included the head of the Cincinnati Chapter of the DAR – Monica Mohlenkamp. Monica introduced the heads of state which included Scott Freeman – President of the Cincinnati SAR, as well as the Ohio President of the Children of the American Revolution – Meridith Haynes.

A terrific lunch was served by the team at the Cincinnati Woman's Club. The venue was perfect for this event and we were not disappointed.

The real draw for this event was the former President. President Washington gave an inspired presentation describing his past, the struggle for independence and the personal challenges he / they faced during his service to our new country and a new form of government.

During the event, the Cincinnati SAR Chapter inducted a new member Cougar Jameson Perkins. As a special touch, his grandmother Natalie Fair-Albright, a Cincinnati Chapter DAR member participated in the induction and she pinned on the rosette on his lapel signifying SAR membership.

At the conclusion of the event, the Cincinnati SAR Color Guard retired the colors, followed by the benediction delivered by Sharon Weber, Chaplain of the Cincinnati DAR.

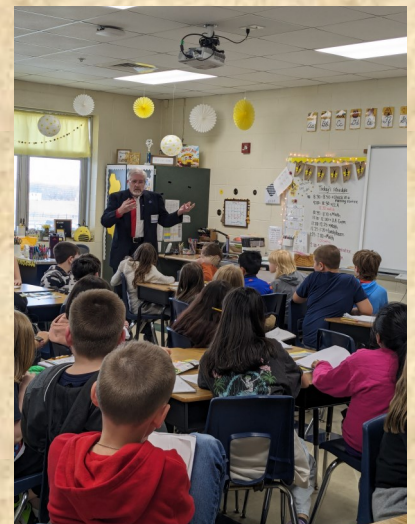
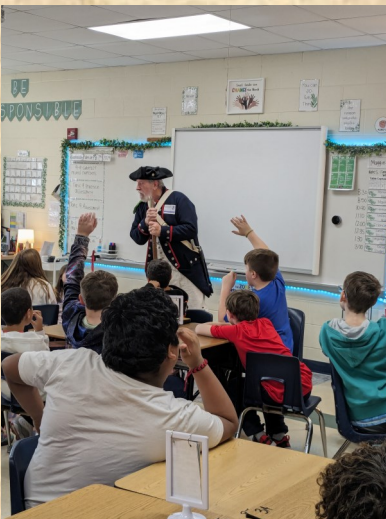
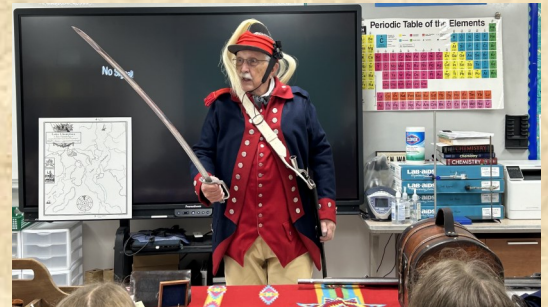
The students are encouraged to ask questions. Our goal is to share history in a three dimensional person to aid in retention of this history.

Support Local Veterans Seeking Continuing Education

Douglas Carver Scholarship Fund

University of Cincinnati—Blue Ash Campus

At our April Cincinnati Chapter SAR meeting, we learned that Compatriot Douglas Carver established a Scholarship Fund for student veterans at the University of Cincinnati's Blue Ash Campus.

This is a terrific gift and we are grateful for Douglas Carver's generosity and support.

UC Blue Ash has over 5000 students around 4% identify as US Veterans. Veterans may be able to take advantage of the GI Bill. Unfortunately, the GI Bill only covers about 25-50% of their overall expenses.

Mr. Carver graciously set up this Veterans Scholarship Fund to bridge the gap between the GI Bill and the full cost of education.

Depending on fund availability, the fund plans to award scholarships up to three (3) students annually in the amount of \$500 per student per year.

Applicants must be considered Veterans of the United States Armed Forces. Preference will be made to students who were deployed overseas during their service.

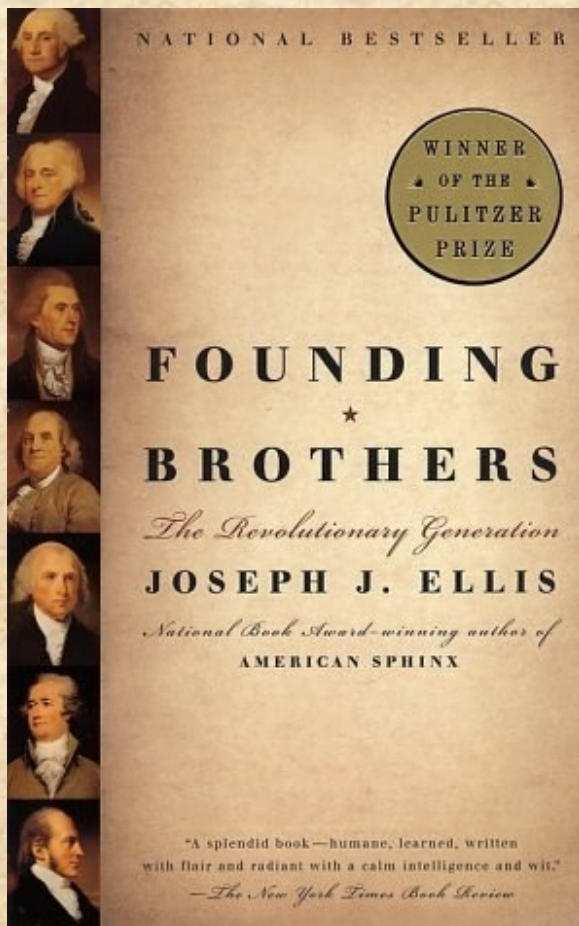
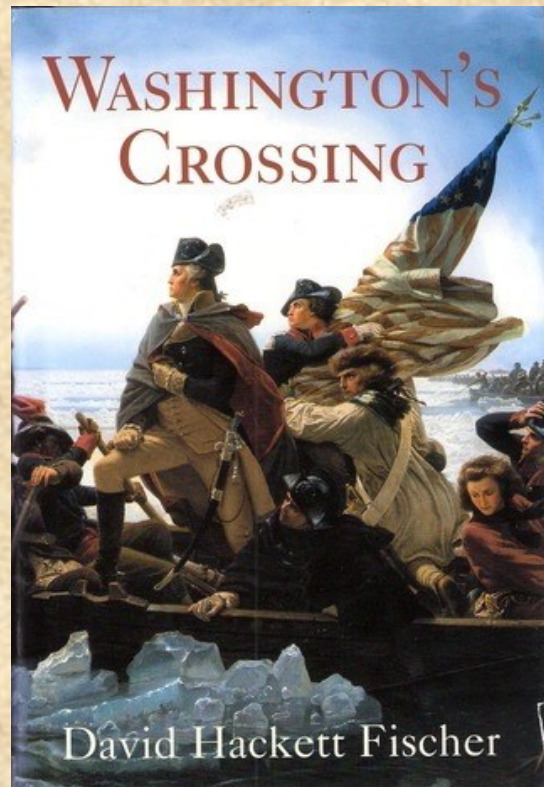
READERS CORNER

Six months after the Declaration of Independence, after a string of military defeats, the American Revolutionary cause seemed lost. The British had routed the Americans at New York, occupied three colonies, and advanced within sight of Philadelphia.

George Washington refused to let the Revolution die. This is the story about the Christmas attack on the Hessian Garrison at Trenton New Jersey which resulted in the surrender of a thousand soldiers.

This book outlines how the campaign unfolded, the difficult decisions and sequence of events which influenced the outcome of the battles. It also contrasts the different fighting style of both armies.

These events captured and propelled the Americans toward a long and hard-fought marathon towards success and victory.



This story studies the intertwined lives of founders John Adams, Aaron Burr, Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and George Washington.

Considered the greatest statesmen of their generation, they came together to lay the course for the new country. This book addresses six defining moments which addressed the most crucial issues facing this fragile new republic.

The book delves into the personalities and characters of these key founders. The author seeks to explore that the checks and balances that permitted the infant American republic to endure were not primarily legal, constitutional, or institutional, but intensely personal resulting in a dynamic interaction of leaders with quite different visions and values.

The result is an understanding of American politics both then and now that helps us understand and share perspective on the unpredictable forces that shaped our history.
